Youngren's Inducted Into The Hall Of Fame

Wendell and Jeanette Youngren were inducted into the Chippewa County Historical Society Hall of Fame on Monday, April 12, 2010 at the Society's Annual Banquet/Annual Meeting held in the Milan

gym. The following is the biographical information which was read for their induction.

The joy of having an individual deeply committed to an organization is only surpassed by having a couple who also shares that same type of commitment. Wendell and Jeanette Youngren are just such a couple. Their dedication to the Chippewa County Historical Society is unwavering in all that they do for one small organization.

Wendell Youngren was born on July 16, 1924 in Willmar, MN. He moved to Woods Township in Chippewa County in 1935 with his family. His parents, August and Minnie Youngren, were blessed with four additional children,

Charlotte Johnson and Vivian Carlson of Kerkhoven, Vernon Youngren of Battle Lake, and Donald Youngren who is now deceased. Jeanette was born on April 16, 1929 in Albert City, IA to David and Hilda Lindstrom. Her family moved to Louriston Township in 1936. Jeanette also has four siblings, June Fransen of St. Louis, MO, Juvette Freas of Eden Prairie, MN, and Eldon and Willard Lindstrom both of whom are now deceased. Wendell and Jeanette were united in marriage on December 30, 1961, and they have resided on the Youngren family home in Woods Township since. Although they were not blessed with children of their own, they have 27 living nephews and nieces of whom they are very proud, and over the years they have enjoyed being invited to events in their active lives. They also have several great nephews and nieces.

Wendell attended grade school in District #83 in Woods Township and graduated from Kerkhoven High School in 1942. Jeanette attended District #38 in Louriston Township, and graduated from Murdock High School in 1946. She received her Associated and Bachelor of Science degree from St. Cloud State University and her Master of Arts degree from the College of Education at the University of Minnesota.

Wendell and Jeanette have both been very active in the Kerkhoven Evangelical Free Church where Jeanette has been very involved in Women's Ministries, and as a Sunday School teacher. Wendell has served in a variety of church offices. Jeanette remains active with the KIP Federated Study Club, is a member of the American Association of University Women, and is a life member of the Minnesota and National Education Association. Wendell has served on the Woods Township board, on the Kerkhoven Elevator Board of Directors and as their Chairman, and is a member of the Minnesota Farmer's Union. In their spare time they enjoy traveling, reading, using the computer, and Jeanette also enjoys doing needle work.

Wendell and Jeanette became active with the Historical Society in 1995 when plans for the Swedish Jubilee were being formalized. They had read about the upcoming event in the local newspaper, and since they are both of Swedish heritage, they eagerly wanted to participate. The rest, as they say, is history!

Wendell served for three years on the Society's Board of Directors, two of those as Vice President. Since 1995 they have been active in almost every facet of the

Historical Society. They volunteer annually for Heritage Week and Christmas in the Village, they have helped with spring cleaning at the Village and the Swensson Farm, are annual hosts at the Village and have hosted Sundays at the Farm, and Wendell has helped with shingling buildings and storm damage cleanup. Additionally, they helped to paint the pressed metal ceiling in the Swensson Farm kitchen, have provided fresh bouquets of flowers for the Horse Power Event, have assisted with the Annual Banquet/Annual Meeting, and have provided food items for various events and programs. The quilt that was donated in 2005 as a raffle for the Church Window Fund was given by the Youngrens. Both Wendell and Jeanette say they have numerous fond memories of the Society including being with so many dedicated people who volunteer for the Society and for an organization that functions so optimistically. Jeanette says that her funniest memory of volunteering for the Society, and it wasn't so funny at the time, was almost falling off the ladder while painting the ceiling in the Swensson Farm house.

Wendell and Jeanette's commitment to the Chippewa County Historical Society is unparalleled. Their willingness to become involved and to remain involved is an inspiration to everyone around them. On behalf of the Chippewa County Historical Society's Board of Directors, staff, and members, thank you, Wendell and Jeanette, for all that you have done and continue to do for our organization, and for being the exceptional and extraordinary people that you are. Congratulations, Wendell and Jeanette!

The low bid of \$2,424.98 for materials only for the Chippewa Bank Building was received from Pro-Build of Montevideo. This amount includes new plywood to re-sheath the entire roof. Sentencing to Service has indicated that they should have time this summer to shingle the building. The Chippewa Bank is the ONE building that must be shingled this year.

If time and finances permit we will next focus on either the Fire Hall, School House, or Garage. We anticipate, however, 'stretching these out', about one per year, unless a more urgent need arises. Each of these structures will use asphalt shingles.



Pioneer Dies After Reaching Age 100

Julius Kurtzbein Came to America in 1868

That same year he built the home in which he still lived with his granddaughter, Mrs. Ed Grams.

From 1895 to 1931, from the age of 55 to 91, Mr. Kurtzbein and his wife farmed alone, his two sons having purchased farms of their own. When the wife of Frank Kurtzbein passed away on July 26, 1897, Mr. Kurtzbein took their youngest daughter, Elsie, to live with them. His wife passed away on April 13, 1931,

and from that date until October he was alone on the farm and did all the farm work and daily chores.

In the fall of 1931 his granddaughter and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Grams, rented the farm from Mr. Kurtzbein and he made his home with them until 1933. Mr. and Mrs. Grams then moved to town, and Mr. and Mrs. Herman Schultz rented the farm and made their home with him for one year. He moved to Montevideo in 1934 with the Grams, and then in the fall of 1939 moved back with the Grams to the home farm. To be continued next month.

Challenge 2010

Although our tools are still packed away, and will be until the beginning of June, planning for the repairs needed at the sites has already begun.

At Historic Chippewa City we will shingle one building and repair and paint two others. We will also continue working on the upper front side of the Millinery Shop. We have a substantial 'micro-list' of things to do as well on each of our buildings.

At the Swensson Farm we need to glaze and paint the basement windows, and repair one of the lower back windows of the barn. We will also be working with professionals to install the new wallpaper upstairs, as well as to repair and preserve the tombstones in the family burial plot. Our 'honey-do' list is substantially shorter for this site in 2010!

We are also hopeful to get more of our buildings handicap accessible this year.

If you recall the January Pioneer Crier, you will remember that there are still tons of additional projects to work on. We will focus on the largest projects and then work our way through the list.

We honestly have a good time as we are working on these projects, so, please join us if you are able!

The following buildings must be repaired and painted in 2010 ...

1. ↗ **Gazebo** - Finish staining the upper half of the structure. Volunteers and stain are needed for this project.

2. ↗ **Ice House** - This building must be repaired and then scraped, primed, and painted. Volunteers and supplies are needed.

3. ↗ **Ag Building** - This building must be repaired and then scraped, primed, and painted. Volunteers and supplies are needed. Perhaps the largest and most physical task on this project is to move all of the lumber, etc. which sits on the north side of the building!

4. ↗ **Millinery Shop** - If time permits we would like to repaint the upper front of this building.
